


NEIGHBORHOODS READY FOR SCHOOL: ROOTS COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

School readiness programs in the neighborhoods that need them the most

Neighborhoods Ready for School (NRFS) is a place-based approach that promotes child- and family-friendly communities, strong families, and school readiness. The strategy informs First 5 Alameda County's policy agenda as well as service delivery and investments. NRFS coordinates existing services and programs and supports strategic investments in infrastructure to enhance and create community assets like Family Resource Centers.

THE FIRST COHORT OF NEIGHBORHOODS READY FOR SCHOOL GRANTEES RECEIVED A 16-MONTH GRANT OF \$470,000:

NEIGHBORHOODS READY FOR SCHOOL: ROOTS COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

Roots Community Health Center offers affordable urgent care and primary care to cities across Alameda County. As part of Neighborhoods Ready for School, Roots Community Health Center plans to develop the East Oakland Ready for School Network, a neighborhood network of nonprofits, community members, and organizations in the East Oakland neighborhood to improve health outcomes and school readiness, particularly for African-American families with children ages birth to five. The Network will address food security and housing stability, increase access to primary care/behavioral health care, employment and training opportunities, and living wage jobs, in addition to increasing the capacity of early childhood partners.

Family Leadership in Action

"Stop Calling Us Names," a series of two community forums held in June 2019, addressed the psychological and systemic effects of labels and stereotypes that hurt African-American children and their families. Both events provided opportunities for parents and caregivers to gain knowledge of parent leadership and advocacy skills and ways to implement them.

Community-driven programs

Roots offers Pop-Up Markets twice a month to families with children birth to age five and other community members. Roots families say that food and community resources offered at Pop-Up Markets supplemented resources lacking in their day-to-day lives. The Pop-Up Markets include interactive nutritious food demonstrations, personalized food bags filled with fresh produce and nutritious food, movement activities, and links to community resources.


